Shaping learning resources for the coworking world

Over the past few months, we've been working hand-in-hand with educators, trainers, and professionals to co-create a meaningful and practical **Resource Kit** tailored to the needs of those navigating Coworking and Collaborative Workspaces (CWS).

What we've done

Across our partner countries – Austria, Estonia, Greece, Spain, the Netherlands, and Portugal – we organised **co-design labs** with VET trainers, researchers, and professionals. These sessions helped us reflect on earlier project findings and identify what types of training materials are truly needed in the coworking landscape.

We then gathered in **Vienna** for a **two-day team meeting** hosted by die Berater, where we brought together all the insights and agreed on the structure and focus of the upcoming RE-WORK VET Resource Kit.

What's coming next

Next up: evaluation workshops in all partner countries!

We'll be inviting trainers and professionals to test the draft materials and share their feedback – helping us refine and improve the kit before its final release.

Once finalised, the Resource Kit will be translated and made freely available online in six languages.

We are excited about the progress made and we are looking forward to sharing the final results with you soon!



What we're working on now

We're currently developing the first version of the **Resource Kit**, using everything we've learned so far. It's a collaborative work-in-progress, carefully shaped around the real needs of those supporting individuals in coworking environments.
